Summer is fast approaching and we are once again running courses aimed at both beginners and improvers in the world of kayaking & canoeing, if you don't know the difference between a kayak and a canoe its time you enrolled on our summer star course. Read on for details of our coaching activities.

The majority of the club coaching of newcomers and improvers will take place at our weekly social gatherings on a Tuesday night at the Hand & Dagger public house on the Lancaster canal. There will be other pool sessions and moving water sessions at other venues according to the requirements of the course syllabi.

Beginners are welcome at the paddle skills pool sessions held once a month.

Paddle skills Pool Sessions; these sessions take place each month (currently on the 2nd Friday) at Fulwood swimming pool, coaches attend these sessions to assist any club members who feel any aspect of their paddling requires a bit of attention. Pre booking is essential for these sessions to prevent overcrowding. Contact Allan Hacking at the Hand & Dagger on a Tuesday night or post a message on the club forum. Normal pool fees apply to these sessions.

1 & 2 star & 3 star WW kayak coaching will take the form of a 10 week course in early summer; this usually allows people to gain new skills ready for use on the club weekend camps.

2010 course dates

Pool sessions; Fridays 16th & 23rd April, 14th May & 11th June.

Outdoor sessions at Hand & Dagger;

Tuesdays from 20th April to 15th June with a break at spring bank, (no session 1st June) this gives 8 practical sessions on the canal. The 3 star course will also have some additional moving water sessions at weekends to be arranged with those on the course. All day outdoor session; Training/trip Sat 12th June, this will probably be on Coniston in the lake district and will take the form of a trip on the lake with some coaching sessions along the way, 1 & 2 star candidates may do the wet bits of their assessment during this session which will allow us to complete their assessments on the canal on Tuesday 22nd June.

Assessment Sat 27th June. 3 star assessment will take place either in the lakes or hopefully at West Tanfield during the first of the summer camps. Any remaining 1 & 2 star assessments may also take place this weekend.

If the assessment dates are a problem for anyone please speak to any of the coaches and we will see what else we can arrange.

The costs for the courses are £30 for junior members and £40 for adult members, plus any additional pool fees and BCU assessment fees.

Please remember we have a selection of boats available to members for use on the courses but you must book them out with Albert, our quartermaster if you want a particular boat.

Did it put us off? Of course not! So on we got. The air was crisp, visibility incredibly clear and the sound of ice cracking as we paddled along was spooky, altogether an incredible experience.



Managed the broken weir with no mishaps but Mike decided to have a play until he got fed up of batting off chunks of ice as they came down onto the playspot. Meanwhile I went to steady myself and ended up with an enormous icicle for my troubles!

There was a genuine sense of relief as we headed under the arches for what we knew was a clear line

Surf's Up! (maybe) Rhosneigr Camp 30th July – 1st August

Have you ever tried surfing in a kayak? Sitting down, not standing up – though you'd get extra marks for style if you did stand up successfully. If you have then you may know about our annual Anglesey Surf Weekend. If not, read on.

One of the few things that you can do in a kayak that beats surfing a glassy green wave on a fast river is surfing down the face of a perfectly formed glassy green wave on the sea – especially if the sun's shining. Every year we have a weekend camp at Rhosneigr on Anglesey. The idea is to pack in as much surfing as possible and have a generally sociable weekend. We don't always get brilliant surf, but there are other attractions – play-boating at the Stanley Embankment wave, seal spotting around some of the offshore islands (using sea kayaks or river boats), beach games, kite flying, beer and barbecues – whatever suits. Is sun guaranteed? Come on now, this is Wales we're talking about – but it is also true that the worst of the wet weather does tend to go straight over and hit Snowdonia instead.

If you've not surfed before this is a good opportunity to learn. As long as you have a

reasonable control of your boat and are prepared to swim a bit you should have fun. Modern river boats with planing hulls work well – most of the club's newer boats fit the bill in this respect. Ultra-short play boats do surf, but can be a bit too slow to catch the waves. Sit-on-tops work well too. I've never seen it tried in a canoe – there's a challenge!

Rhosneigr is on the North West corner of Anglesey. If you've been before you'll know where the campsite is, if not I will be putting details on the club forum – look out for details. The site is fairly basic – no water park or cabaret, but it has hot showers and is not normally crowded. We usually travel to Anglesey on Friday night, but you can always come up on Saturday.

Please let me know if you're coming either direct or via the forum. There is no need to book with the site (unless you have a camper van or caravan or want electric). The site is fairly relaxed about numbers, but if we're going to have a lot more than expected I'd like to let them know.

There have been approximately 60 enquiries for new membership received via the website during 2009 as well as people contacting myself and Terry by phone or just turning up at the pool or Hand & Dagger. We look forwards to entering the warmer weather with well attended beginners' trips to introduce new paddlers to paddling and the club.

During 2009 there were no substantial communications other than annual affiliation to the BCU.

In 2009 there were General Committee Meetings in January, March, May, July, September and November, as well as the AGM in February. There was at least 9 members at each meeting, an average of 10, with the highest attendance of 12 for the March meeting.

Alternating with the General Committee there were Coaching Forum Meetings. The numbers attending these meetings were more variable. We'd like to encourage existing coaches and those interested in coaching to come along.

Once again the summer training courses were healthily attended with two 1\2star groups and a large 3 star moving water group.

Treasurer's report 2009 - Kath Risely, presented by Albert Risely

A copy of the Accounts including the Property Schedule has been circulated to members.

From these you will see that income from Membership fees and courses is in line with previous years. This year's courses saw many members, both new and old, taking part in the annual 'Star Awards' which in 2009 included a 3 Star course for the first time in several years. Courses generate a good part of the Club's income and once again, thanks go to our volunteer coaches for the time they have spent in running these.

We received a grant of £608 from the Canoe England Canoe Foundation towards the construction of the new path from the container at the rear of the Hand & Dagger down to the canal. The total cost to date is £968 with the likelihood that more will need to be spent in the spring in an attempt to improve the drainage and stop it once more becoming the quagmire that we saw last summer. However, the benefits of the path certainly outweigh the costs to the Club. As well as the financial expense we have had a couple of working days when volunteers carried out the construction of both path and handrail and thanks must go to them also.

There has again been very modest support for polo and slalom sessions but it is proposed to persevere with these sessions and promote them more actively through the Newsletter and the Forum in the coming year. The paddle skills and open pool sessions have generally been well attended with just occasional ones being under subscribed, several during the bad weather at the end of the year.

2009 has seen the club invest heavily in training. We have subsidised the costs of two members to achieve their level 1 coaching qualification and two to achieve level 3 status. Six members have passed their Foundation Safety & Rescue Test thereby enabling them to supervise at the Friday night pool sessions and also work towards their coaching awards. Twelve coaches or trip leaders have attended White Water Safety and Rescue courses, which have been partially subsidised by the club. Members and coaches have also attended a Child Protection Course and 12 members attended a First Aid Course.

The Sundry Expenditure figure includes a donation of £250, which equates to approximately £1 per member, to the Cumbria Flood Recovery Fund and also a donation of £50 to the Langdale & Ambleside Mountain Rescue team. We all paddle, and most of us walk or cycle and we derive much enjoyment from visiting the Lake District. As such it seemed only fair to make a contribution during the difficult times which followed the flooding at the end of last year. I think anyone who

visited the area shortly afterwards could not fail to be moved by the devastation to places that we know so well.

The bank balance has remained constant at just under £9000. This figure includes the sum of £1082 which was previously known as the Halton Fund. This money was collected from various sources in the 1980's when slalom events were held at Halton and was written back into the accounts in 2005 when the passage of time made it unlikely that these funds would be called upon. This situation may now have changed and Terry will shortly go into more detail about developments.

Overall the clubs position is looking healthy and we are hoping to continue in the same vein for this coming year.

Competition Secretary's report – presented by Rachel Desmond-Drew

This is the competition report for 2009.

I took over the role of competition secretary in May 2009 from Allan Hacking and I would like to thank him for his hard work and enthusiasm that he brought to the role in promoting competition within Ribble Canoe Club.

This year has been another quiet year on the competition front however, we have had some fantastic results in the disciplines which Ribble paddlers take part in.

Slalom:

Slalom has been active again this year with Ribble Canoe Club being represented by Tim Merrick in Prem, Alex Jones & Mick Huddleston in Div 1, Roy Garriock & Ian Burt in Div 2/3, and Jonathan and Jacquelyn Shaw.

Jonathan is currently paddling C1 and C2 in prem and is currently in position 112 in ICF world rankings for C1 Mens. Jacquelyn is Bib 1 in the C1 category and in position 10 in the world rankings for C1 Women's in 2009.

Both Jonathan and Jacquelyn represented GB seniors in summer 2009 taking part in World Series races across Europe with Jacquelyn coming 3rd in C1 in the German Open and Jonathan coming 2nd in the Teen Cup in the Czech Republic.

Alexandra Elkington has also represented Ribble Canoe Club in Slalom this year.

She took 2nd place at Marple Slalom, 1st at Slenningford Watermill which lead to her promotion into Div 3. Alex then took 2nd place in her first Div 3 race at Sowerby Bridge. She finished the year 52nd out of 133 in a year hampered by an injury from open boating. I wish her all the best for a speedy recovery and hope to see her out on the water again soon.

Freestyle:

Ben and Dom Brayfield took part at the 2009 British Freestyle Championships at Holme Pierrepont in September, competing in the K1 Mens section with Ben making it through to the semi finals.

Mags Brayfield and Will Body also took part in the Novice section of the Freestyle Championships which comprised of a freestyle event on the Tardis wave at HPP, a slalom event and boater-x. Will finished 4th overall with Mags in 12th position.

Seaquest 2009:

Ribble had a big turn out at Seaquest and Seatour the year. Mick Huddleston arrived back in 4th place, Mags Brayfield came in as 1st lady, Andy Biggs, Albert Risely, Richard Collins, Roy Booth, Gary and Adam Fishwick, Jack Powell, Paul and Sam Binks also took part. Hon. Chairman's report – Terry Maddock Chairman's Report – 25 February 2010

A year ago we had just said goodbye to our landlords here at the Hand and Dagger. Nothing much changes does it? Except that today our regrets at losing Allan & Lucy are especially deep because they have been such good friends to us. They're only moving as far as The Dunes in Blackpool, so we hope that Connor will be able to continue paddling with us. Michael and Karen have just taken over (yesterday) and we hope to have a long and happy relationship with them.

Our new access path down to the canal was constructed in the first half of the year by some of our keenest, fittest and best looking members. It has been a great success but during the very wet summer and winter has become a quagmire in places. When (if) the drier weather arrives we will sort the problem by improving the drainage.

The "summer" courses went well using the BCU Star Awards rather than the Paddlepower system used the previous year. We aim to improve the running of the courses this coming summer, particularly easing the burden on our coaches. Many thanks to Allan Hacking for organising the courses over the past few years and the coming year. Joanne Hacking presented the awards with a talk and DVD show of her adventures canoeing in Uganda on big and scary water.

Early in the year Pat and Norman Green took over from Martin Stockdale the editorship and publishing of our magazine. I think we can say that the previous high standard has been maintained.

The Easter Scottish Week was again held at Ardhu and was attended by about 30 members. All the traditional trips and some new ones were paddled. Despite its resounding success over many years, next Easter's trip seems to be languishing due to lack of interested members.

Our summer camps went well despite a lot of weather. At West Tanfield we had about 40 members, 4 dogs and Holly. The river was low resulting in the cancellation of the Ure trip. However a lot of fun was had on the rapids and pool within the site and Allan was able to complete several 3 Star assessments. About 20 members were at Rhosneigr, some paddling to the "Inland Sea" and back whilst others found good surf at Aberffraw. In summer Ed Lefley organised an Ardeche Camp where 17 members enjoyed a fortnights paddling in hot weather and warm water. Several did a two-day trip with a bivvy camp in between. The fortnight was a resounding success thanks to Ed's hard work and efficient organisation. This was the club's first trip abroad for several years and there is a good deal of interest in doing another. The Ullswater Camp was held this year at Bala, North Wales as opposed to Coniston in the previous two years. Despite the dismal weather, about a dozen members turned up and paddled Llyn Tegid (Lake Bala) or the river Tryweryn. On Sunday seven did the Lower Tryweryn trip. The Tyne Tour was popular with Ribble this year and, for the first time we had canoes as well as kayaks on the river.

The year ended with two unusual happenings. The weather was one, giving us prolonged cold snaps and snow. Ice and low water alternated with thaws giving short periods of high water. The other happening happened at Halton. Pat and Norman Green had already extended our access from 3 months to just over 5. Now they have been building bridges (metaphorically) with the new owners of the right bank, Lancaster Cohousing. Opportunities have arisen for possible provision of toilets and changing facilities plus, maybe, access steps, particularly useful for launching open canoes. With access issues under consideration by Parliament, who knows where all this may lead. Pat has set up a steering committee of members of northwest canoe clubs and the BCU. Norman is Ribble's representative on that committee as Pat is there as Local River Advisor for the BCU.

Over twenty years ago, a consortium of northwest canoe clubs ran very successful slaloms at Halton. Norman has compiled a DVD from film made at the time and this is available to borrow from our library. The consortium for development and running of slaloms at Halton held money collected by way of various fees and charges from slalom entrants. Unfortunately access to various essential facilities was lost in the late 1980's and no future for slalom there was foreseeable. The consortium disbanded and cash assets of about £1,083 were passed to Ribble CC. Our accounts have always demonstrated the club's attitude to the origins and status of this money. It was at times held in a separate account and when otherwise, the notes to our annual accounts have stated that £1,083 of the club's cash at bank included the "Halton Fund". At a Special Committee Meeting on 9 February this year the Committee formally acknowledged the existence of the "Halton Fund" and agreed that it should be handed over in parts or as a whole when requested by the Halton Steering Committee subject to the satisfaction of the Ribble CC General Committee regarding the nature of the expense or the status of the receiving body.

Lastly, Pat has received from the BCU their Access Volunteer of the Year Award, as announced in February's edition of Canoe Focus. I think we can all agree that this was very well deserved and in addition to thanking Pat for all her hard work and negotiating skill, I must thank the person who nominated her for the award. I wish I'd thought of it.
