It was strange paddling off shore in the dark; you become much more aware of "wearing your boat". Your senses change as you react to conditions by feel rather than sight. It wasn't long before we were much more at home and enjoying the experience.

Paddling in a small group it was unbelievably quiet until we got to South Pier. The music and noise from the Fair, the glaring lights, the smells of burgers and candyfloss were in total contrast to the darkness and silence just a couple of minutes before.

At this point I realised how much the flu had taken out of me and John Roberts and I sadly left the group and made our way back to Starr Gate.

I'm told that Terry now knows where the starlings of Blackpool roost at night, under the Piers. They left their mark, say no more!

Nature played quite a part in the trip.
Although we didn't see any seals this time, as we made our way back we were treated to one of natures' own light shows. John noticed that as we paddled, our bow waves and paddle swirls light up fluorescent green, a phenomenon known as bioluminescence. The crests of the waves literally glowed as they broke and we slipped silently out of the blackness and onto the sand. Amazing and just off Blackpool to!

The others returned safe and sound shortly after us. Then, after letting the coastguard know were all back, that was it, all over for 2009. Roll on 2010!

The Riverdance grounding:-

In defence of two local celebrities

On 31st January 2008, the Bahamas registered Ro-Ro cargo vessel Riverdance grounded and

became stranded on Shell Flats off Cleveleys Beach, Lancashire.

In February 2008 Messrs Burger, Burger & Pie Solicitors did maliciously and wrongfully state in the Lancashire based Canoe Club forum of Ribble Canoe Club and again at a later date supply dubious evidence to support such a claim at a Christmas party attended by the aforementioned canoe club members that the Riverdance disaster was due to actions relating to a misplaced kayaking safety item. Namely a 'throwline' becoming entangled in the vessels propeller. Messrs Burger, Burger & Pie suggested that the 'throwline' once owned by Mr Roscoe and misplaced by Mr Dillon somewhere downstream of Halton Rapids on the River Lune in Lancashire became entangled in the Riverdance propeller train. In defence of this allegation we Messrs Flagging, Windy & Tired are acting on behalf of internationally renowned sea kayaker Mr Peter Duracell Roscoe and Local nobody Mark Crappaddler Dillon

The Marine Accident Investigation Branch (MAIB) enquiry published on 3rd September numbered 18/2009 quite clearly refutes the above allegations and sites several reasons for the Riverdances' demise. www.maib.gov.uk

The following is a summary of the main causal factors and key events that were identified during the investigation:

- The true weights and the disposition of the vessel's cargo were not known.
- The stability of Riverdance was not calculated before sailing from Warrenpoint.
- Ballast was never adjusted regardless of cargo or expected weather.
- Some openings on the weather deck were not closed off in anticipation of the expected poor weather.
- The vessel was proceeding in following seas at a speed slightly slower than that of the following wave train. Under these circumstances, a reduction in the vessel's stability can occur and more pronounced rolling can be experienced.

- As the vessel approached more shallow waters, the seas became steeper and rolling increased further. This resulted in a small shift of cargo to port.
- The vessel sustained a series of large rolls to port which caused additional trailers and their contents to shift.
- In an attempt to bring the vessel's head into the wind, the master decided to make a broad alteration to starboard. This exacerbated the port heel causing the deck edge to immerse, possibly allowing water to enter the vessel through openings on her weather deck. Ingress of water would have further reduced the vessel's residual stability.
- The port main engine tripped due to the excessive list and, with only one engine, there was not enough power to bring the ships head into the wind. The vessel lay beam on to the wind and seas, rolling heavily with a large list to port as she drifted towards shallow water. The weather deck on the port side continued to be intermittently immersed.
- The vessel took the ground and returned to an almost upright position. An attempt was made to redistribute the ballast to compensate for the expected port list once she re-floated on the rising tide.
- Because the disposition of the weights on board the vessel was unknown, the amount of ballast transferred was based on the master's estimate. The owner's shore based crisis management team did not have access to accurate stability information. Had this been available they would have been able to provide better support to the master.

Clearly the evidence gleaned from the enquiry clears my clients of all blame in this marine disaster, however in conjunction with the MAIB investigation and acting on behalf of my clients, further information that may have relevance to the demise of the vessel and the problems related around cargo weights and disposition has come to light and are detailed as:

- A stowaway had unbeknown to the Riverdance captain entered the vessel and concealed himself in a storage area amidships on the starboard side.
- The stowaway identified as Mr B.Boy -an amply proportioned Preston area socially unaccepted ragamuffin with a healthy appetite
- was seeking a free ride (nothing new there) to attend an urgent coaching update in Lancashire in order to gain favour with a local canoe club.
- The main cargo of the Riverdance was food stuffs in particular a product called Digestive Biscuits, a favourite of Mr Boy.



- Several days into the trip it appears as though Mr Boy had eaten most of the biscuits on the starboard side and went looking for more on the port side. His movements combined with the exceptionally bad weather caused the vessel to list to the port side.
- Despite attempts by the Riverdance captain to correct the vessels list, movements around the mid deck area by Mr Boy continued to cause the vessel to roll excessively and as previously described in the MAIB investigation the Riverdance was doomed.
- Mr Boy was seen by local residents and coastguards wobbling from the scene shortly after the grounding clutching a crate of

biscuits and trying to bribe someone to be his friend.

In summary, the preceding two investigations into this tragedy clearly exonerate my clients of all blame in the actions of the night of 31st January 2008. Upon this premise I shall be in contact with Burger, Burger and Pie to seek recompense for damage to my clients good name and an apology.

Tryweryn Pyranha Fest 2009

Despite a distinct lack of Ribble attendees at this year's event the main people were there, those being Serious Allan, Jo the Map, Burger Boy, Hotfoot and myself with Mags and the Brayfield clan in tow. The weather was glorious and with a guarantee of water a top quality weekend would hopefully be in store.

For this year Burger Boy and I were determined to do the whole river trip from above the Chipper all the way to the get out at Bala including the whole of the Tryweryn course and Bala Mill Falls. In previous years we had missed sections for one reason or another – namely a badly bruised bum last year for me curtailing the trip - and we had always missed out on the lower stretch trips.

Upon arriving we checked into our 'accommodation', not the usual top notch B & B that we use but this time the PGL squat on the shores of Bala Lake. I know everyone who is great at paddling says the lower stretch is boring but let me tell you we loved it. The anticipation of running a piece of river without a guide was fantastic and we approached every rapid in a read and run manner and scouted from the boat, we did exactly what it says in the book.

The stretch is full of features and made for a great trip with lots of eddies to catch and mid river rocks to negotiate unless you're HF who seemed to want to hit them all.

On the way down we eddied out at various places and all went smoothly especially for HF who even caught the eddie on the river right half way down the falls, top man.

With our intrepid trio safely at the bottom we practiced rolling and with none missed this time I was the only one of our band who had suffered that fate, and so headed off for the get out and long journey home satisfied that this weekend only the Buddha was perfect, and of course on this occasion HF.

To keep some control over what entries get made on the calendar we have restricted the permissions needed to add/change entries to members of the coaching forum and committee. If you are going to be running trips/events and think you should have the necessary permission please speak to a member of the committee. If you have any views on the new format - favourable or otherwise - again, please speak to a member of the committee.

Chairman's Chunter

We're back at Halton and with good water levels so far. I didn't go myself this year, but I hear that the Tyne Tour went very well. The club was represented by both kayaks and canoes for the first time, I think. Keep an eye on the Forum on our Web Site for what's going on, especially for novice paddlers and improvers.

The recent committee Meeting was one of the longest for some time, logging $2\frac{2}{3}$ hours. Well, we had a lot to talk about :-

Ed's looking at a potential summer trip in foreign parts.

Paul's organising the Dumbongo Fun Night on Fri 18 Dec. He's looking for 4 teams. So get in touch with him if you have a team (pref 6 people) or if you want to join a team. I'm looking for mature paddlers to join my proposed "Old Feckers" team.

Albert and Kath are organising a ceilidh (kayli) probably for some time in March. There's a thread on the Forum where you can register your interest on a poll.

Albert's been busy building a new rack in the Container and another rack's ongoing.

Mark Shaw brought to our attention the availability of grants in the run up to the 2012 Olympics to purchase slalom boats and equipment. The Committee felt that whilst it encourages and supports members pursuing slalom, there were problems of storage space and a lack of any apparent demand. Further, any acquisition of boats/equipment would need to be accompanied by a programme of slalom coaching. If you feel that the Committee has misread the feelings of the Club in this matter, please feel free to voice your concerns to me or to any committee member. Of course, you may be assumed to be offering your services to apply for a grant, coach slalom and/or store the boats in your garage.

A proposal to obtain another one or more open boats was postponed pending a look at what space, if any could, be created in the container by selling some older boats or storing them outside.

The Environment Agency's "Strategic Planning of Water Related Sports and Recreation in England and Wales" was noted with interest. If any member wants to study the 88 page report in detail and report back to the Committee please let me know.

Pat and Norman Green have been discussing with the new owners, the possible improvement of facilities/access on the north bank of the Lune at Halton. The BCU and other NW Clubs have been informed and we await any developments with interest.

The pool sessions at Fulwood Leisure Centre were programmed for the period Christmas to Easter.

The Coaching Forum's proposal to take over the organising of the calendar was welcomed, as was Paul's suggestion of running monthly canal sessions on a Saturday throughout the winter when paddling on a Tuesday night was not considered an option by our more normal members.

Ed is organising a 3 Star Open Boat course for some time in the New Year with fees of £30/£20 adults/juniors.

It was agreed that a slalom session be programmed at the pool for 26 February 2010.

The routine review of Club Policies is to continue with the formation of a single Club Code of Conduct as soon as (a) BCU template(s) can be found and extracted from their web site.

BCU Affiliation Fees are due by 4 December.

The Quartermaster had completed a full stock take and all was present and correct. It was agreed that surplus boats from the Container and the pool store should be offered to Club members for a donation.
